In February, WCCC Directors along with 2 youth selected from the Webb County Community Youth Coalition attended the Community Anti-Drug Coalitions of America (CADCA) Leadership Forum from February 7-11. The youth selected were Alvaro Guel and Joel Garza both juniors at United South High School. These young men were selected from several other youth coalition members based on an essay and volunteer hours required to be able to become eligible to attend this great event. Coalition members from across the U.S. came together to learn different ways of preventing drug abuse, bullying, and to learn ways to become leaders within their communities.



Salvia Divinorum



Salvia is an herb in the mint family available in different flavors and potency that has been used as a hallucinogenic drug. Salvia is most commonly smoked out of a bong, pipe or joint. The fresh leaves can be chewed and either swallowed or held against the cheek. The effects can last from 20 minutes to 1 hour depending on how it is consumed. According to the National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA), side effects can include changes in visual perception and mood swings, feeling detached, and a decreased awareness of one's surroundings. This drug is available online and in many smoke shops across the United States including Texas. Salvia's legality varies from state to state. Fifteen states including Florida have banned its sale. There are a handful of states that have various restrictions on its sale, possession and consumption yet the majority of states have no laws prohibiting it. Salvia is not regulated under the Controlled Substance Act. It has been growing in popularity; however, the DEA is monitoring it for possible future regulations.

National Children of Alcoholics Week

National Children of Alcoholics Week was held February 13 to 19, 2011. This annual event is held to raise awareness of the many children with an alcohol-dependent parent and to celebrate the recovery of the many children that have received the help they need to deal with the pain endured in their childhood due to alcoholic parents.

It is estimated that 25 percent of all children in the United States are in some way affected by alcohol problems in their family. Children of parents who abuse alcohol are at a greater risk for trauma including verbal, physical, and sexual abuse, as well as neglect. Compared with children whose caregivers are not alcoholics, children of alcoholics (COAs) exhibit more symptoms of depression and anxiety, have lower self-esteem, and have more health problems including injuries, mental disorders, and substance abuse. In addition, COAs often have difficulty in school: they score lower on tests, have trouble concentrating, and are more likely to drop out.

The following are some ways to help make a difference in the life of a child with alcoholic parents.

- Speak out as an organization and as an individual
- Let COAs know that they are not alone, that responsible adults are available to help them
- Encourage COAs to ask for help.
- Participate annually in Children of Alcoholics Week
